## Minutes

### **Minutes:**

### Vote #2022-16

Motion made by Commissioner Johnson and seconded by Commissioner Homan to approve the minutes of the April 26, 2022 and May 17, 2022 meeting. **Unanimous** 

### Vote #2021-17

It was moved by Commissioner Homan and seconded by Commissioner Johnson to approve the General Manager's recommendation for distribution of yearend 2021 available cash as follows:

Pilot Payment to the Town of Marblehead: \$330,000.00. Unanimous

#### **Village 13 Transformer and Switchgear Replacement:**

The request for bids will be advertised mid-June with a deadline of July 6, 2022 @ 1:30.

## **Tree Contract:**

General Manager signed a tree contract with Mayer Tree. Contract is for \$250K for pole to pole span trimming and \$50k for dead tree removal not to exceed \$300K. The work will commence the week of June 20, 2022. The crew will begin with the transmission lines coming in from Salem at Lead Mills.

#### **Mass CZM Resiliency Grant:**

A hybrid meeting will be held at Abbot Hall on Thursday, June 9 to discuss the Town's plan for the CZM resiliency grant. The flood door for 80 Commercial Street east facing basement door will be installed the week of June 13<sup>th</sup> to be complete the week of June 20<sup>th</sup>.

## **80 Commercial St Gates and Fences:**

General Manager Kowalik updated the Commissioners on the project.

### Vote # 2022-18

It was moved by Commissioner Frechette and seconded by Commissioner Homan to authorize General Manager Kowalik to facilitate the bids for engineering and construction. <u>Unanimous</u>

### **2021A Offshore Wind:**

MMLD participation will be 3.8% of the project representing 16,000 mwh's annually. The participation is a PPA, with an estimated price per kwh not to exceed \$.0774/kwh. The estimated price includes two environmental attributes, Mass Class Recs and clean Peak Revenue Certificates. The PPA is for a 20-year term with an estimated start date of Q1 2028.

## **Commissioner Wolf distributed the following correspondence:**

- Strategic Plan for adding supply line in to Marblehead
  - Evaluate and compare options
  - o Evaluate dedicated high voltage circuit
- Flatten peak
  - Resolve Metering issue/obstacles to TOU rates
  - Develop Time-of-Use rates Pilot program
  - Pilot Residential PV + battery program
  - o Promote enrollment in Connected Homes/demand-response program
- Strategic electrification
  - o Develop GIS to track new loads from EV's, heat pumps
  - Accelerate adoption of heat pumps → target oil heating systems for conversion
  - Plan for expanding EV charging infrastructure
- Customer education
  - o Update and maintain website, fb, social media
  - Customer survey
  - Hire or train staff to be able to promote MMWEC carbon-reduction programs
  - Move forward with newsletter
  - Refine Peak communications targeting ALL customers
- Build updated GIS system
  - Code residences by heating, EVs, DERs
  - Circuit map by transformer

**MMLD Sustainability Fund:** This memo was presented for discussion, but no formal policy has been adopted

#### **Background:**

- MMLD currently sells a majority of its Class 1 RECs (\$120,000 in 2021); and thereby does not retain the environmental attributes of this energy;
- Consequently, MMLD's 'clean energy' portion of its energy supply is <0.1%, as compared with a 16 % mandated requirement of IOU's in 2021;
- Previously MMLD rejected the Green Communities requirement of adding a \$0.0005/kWh surcharge on customer's bills, thereby forfeiting Marblehead's access to \$250,000 in grant funds designed to give assistance for community efficiency and electrification initiatives
- MMLD has cited concerns about 'in perpetuity' payments to the Green Communities fund, and the regressive nature of the surcharge
- The sum of the sale of RECs plus the avoided surcharge = \$170,000

## **Proposal:**

- Establish a dedicated MMLD Sustainability Fund;
- Deposited Funds will be equal to the amount from sold REC's plus the forfeited Green Communities grant monies
- Amount will be approximately \$370,000
- Funds will be directed to sustainability initiatives, which will be prioritized and selected by a Sustainability Working Group, composition to be determined.
- Possible initiatives:
  - o Community solar generation facilities;
  - o Power storage for peak electric use times;
  - Infrastructure such as public charging stations for electric vehicles, and other similar programs;
  - Residential rebates/Incentives for electrification and efficiency.

#### Models:

- **Ipswich \$265,000/yr -** "we treat our Sustainability Fund very similarly to the Depreciation Fund. Each year we expense \$265K against a specific line in our operating budget and deposit the cash into a dedicated, restricted account. We then create a standalone budget to forecast and track the spending of that cash account."
- Wellesley 4% of residential monthly bills goes to "Wellesley's WECARE program a utility initiative that funds local renewable energy projects to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and preserve the planet. Residents are automatically enrolled."
- **Hingham** from sale of class 1 RECs minus what is spent on purchase of class 2 RECs to cover the entire portfolio.

The Commissioners will continue discussion of the proposed 2022-2023 goals and objectives after hearing the General Manager's recommendations at the next meeting and will vote to adopt a finalized list.
